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## Safe Arrival Phone App

Parents recently received a communication announcing NNEC will now be using the Safe Arrival App through School Messenger. Safe Arrival is a phone app that allows parents and guardians to notify the school in advance about an upcoming absence or rapidly respond to excuse an absence after the fact. In both situations, parents can send attendance alerts to schools for all of their children and provide a reason for each absence – all in one simple communication.

With **SafeArrival**, you are asked to report your child's absence in advance using any of these 3 convenient methods:

- Using your mobile device, download and install the SchoolMessenger app from the Apple App Store or the Google Play Store
- Use the SafeArrival website, go.schoolmessenger.ca.
- Call the toll-free number [1-833-578-0533] to report an absence using the automated phone system.

These options are available 24 hours/day, 7 days a week. Future absences can be reported at any time.

Additionally, the **NNEC Attendance Line** remains available. Call 902-755-8180 Option 1 and leave a message that includes the students name, reason for the absence and symptoms (ie. sore throat, stuffy nose etc.). Schools still require this information when reporting attendance numbers to Public Health.

#### ATTENDANCE NOTIFICATIONS

The automated notification system will contact parents whose child is absent without notification. Families, who have <u>not</u> reported their child's absence, will receive an attendance notice at 5:30 pm.

The automated notification system will attempt to contact parents at multiple contact points until a reason is submitted for the absence. If you report your child's absence in advance using the Safe Arrival toll-free number, website or mobile app, you will NOT receive these notifications. Parents will have until approximately 10:00 pm to submit a reason for their child's absence.

#### SIGN OUTS DURING CLASS TIME

If a student must sign out during a class, parents are asked to leave a message on the *NNEC Attendance Line* rather than using the Safe Arrival App. Reporting through Safe Arrival will <u>NOT</u> notify the school or classroom teacher, that the student will be leaving class early, until the following day. Parents are asked to follow the same process for reporting absences (see below) as End of Day Pick-up.

## Attention Parents: Process For End of Day Pick-up

Each day we receive a high volume of phone calls during last period class. Parents have been calling to have their child released from class to avoid end of day traffic. As communicated previously, this causes a lot of disruption during instructional time. For this reason, we request students not be signed out during last period class, without prior notice. Emergency situations will be handled on a case by case basis.

NNEC's school day ends at **3:10 pm** and students are expected to stay in class until the bell rings. If a student must leave during 4th period, parents are asked to report this to our attendance line, **no later than 12:30 pm** on that day. This will allow the office time to notify teachers without class disruption.

## **Food Security**

The Gryphon's Den Pantry has been providing food to students and families as part of our food security initiative. With rising food costs, many families are left struggling. Hunger has a direct impact on student success. Students with reliable access to nutritious food are healthier both mentally and physically.

NNEC's breakfast program has a variety of food items available each morning such as bagels, cheese, fresh fruit as well as a number of snack items.
